Endogenous Monitoring in a Partnership Game. Revise and resubmit, American Economic Review. I consider a repeated game in which, due to imperfect monitoring, no collusion can be sustained. I add a self-interested monitor who commits to monitoring firms' actions and sends a public message to firms. The monitor makes a TIOLI offer to firms specifying the monitoring intensity and the per-period fee to be paid. I show that provided the cost of monitoring is sufficiently low, fully collusive equilibria exist. In the set of fully collusive equilibria that maximize the monitor's payoff, firms' payoffs are decreasing in the discount factor.

Necessary and Sufficient Conditions for Equilibrium Uniqueness in a Repeated Partnership Game. I consider a repeated partnership game with imperfect public monitoring, in which the standard sufficient conditions for the Folk Theorem fail. I provide necessary and sufficient conditions under which the only equilibrium in public strategies is perpetual defection, independent of the discount factor.

The Incentive Effect of Prison on Criminal Asset Recovery. Using administrative, cross-sectional data on confiscation orders in the United Kingdom, I estimate the effect of longer prison sentences on criminal asset recovery. Confiscation orders request convicted offenders to pay the value of their criminal assets, and specify a prison sentence to be served in the case of non-payment. Using a fuzzy RDD, I exploit discontinuous changes in the legal maximum of this prison sentence which depend on the value of the confiscation order. I find that there is evidence that longer prison sentences incentivize offenders to satisfy their order.
